Early Learning Collaboratives (ELCs)

Early Learning Collaboratives bring together local stakeholders such as city and school leaders, parents, teachers and businesses.

Collaboratives are built on the premise that the best solutions are homegrown, originating from the understanding of each community's unique context and needs. By investing in Early Learning Collaboratives, we aim to ensure that every Idaho child has the chance to develop the critical skills they need to thrive in school and beyond. By working together, we build and expand access to affordable, quality early learning opportunities.

CASTLEFORD ELC A small town sees big early learning success!

Castleford, Idaho is a small town 30 minutes west of Twin Falls. Before August 2024, there were zero child care programs in Castleford. After months of planning and development in partnership with Castleford School District, Idaho AEYC, and the Workforce Development Council, Castleford Early Learning Collaborative opened its first preschool, Wolf Pup Preschool, serving 18 students, and has the capacity to scale up to 34 students. They are using a play-based curriculum that will support children's transition to kindergarten.

Teton Valley Collaborative for Early Learning

The Teton Valley Collaborative for Early Learning celebrated the opening of a child care center this year at the newly relocated and remodeled Gamble House. This achievement was the result of incredible investment and coordination between Teton School District, Sweet Spirits Preschool & Child Care, Idaho AEYC, private donors and additional stakeholders. In June, the Gamble House was donated and moved onto school district property. In September, Sweet Spirits began providing care in a community that has been struggling to keep child care businesses afloat. Idaho AEYC has been a proud partner in this process!

Early Learning Day

Idaho AEYC hosted our third annual Early Learning Day at the Capitol on February 6th, 2024. At this event, advocacy cohorts took part in 34 legislative meetings. Providers and parents, many of them involved in our Early Learning Collaborative (ELC) network, met with their legislative delegations to share their stories, discuss the early childhood needs in their communities and to ask for support in improving Idaho's early childhood landscape.

The IdahoStars Project

IdahoSTARS is a joint project between the University of Idaho - Idaho Center on Disabilities and Human Development and Idaho AEYC. The project is funded by the Child Care Development Block Grant through the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.



STEPS TO QUALITY

QUALITY ACHIEVERS

Steps to Quality (STQ) is Idaho's Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS) supported through the work of the IdahoSTARS Project. Participation in STQ is voluntary for Idaho child care programs, ensuring those involved are committed to improving their quality practices.

Through listening to child care professionals, studying national trends and receiving input from other states' strategies, we will be transitioning to our new QRIS system, Quality Achievers, in 2025. Participants will see new structures that focus on recognizing a program's definition of quality in a more tailored and relevant way. Programs will be encouraged to work in areas that naturally make sense for their staff, children and families.

ICCP & State Licensing Support

Our IdahoSTARS Customer Support Team (CST) supports child care programs participating in the Idaho Child Care Program (ICCP), which assists low-income families with child care tuition through the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. Additionally, the IdahoSTARS Project supports providers licensed throughout the state. The CST works with new and renewing child care programs to ensure that all requirements and documentation are met to participate in those programs. Their assistance means more financially stable programs for child care providers and families.

We equip early educators with the resources they need to deliver exceptional early childhood education, ensuring that our collective efforts set the stage for a lifetime of learning.

In June, over 350 attendees from across the state participated in over 20 workshops at our two-day Idaho Early Learning Conference. This year's Keynote Speaker, Dr. Junlei Li of Harvard's Early Childhood Education Program, shared inspiring research on how connecting with the hearts of children matters more than the tools and resources we use, whether it be in a home-care setting or in an early learning classroom, simple interactions can make all the difference.

Professional Development

We provided over 250 training sessions and workshops, enhancing the competencies of over 1,200 Early Care and Education Professionals. The sessions were available in a variety of topic areas relevant to early care and education professionals in Idaho, including: infant and early childhood mental health, nutrition and active play, early literacy and math, conscious discipline, Child Development Associates support, trauma-informed practices, and strength-based approaches for early care.

Strengthening Families[™] Trainings

We hosted a Strengthening Families[™] Protective Factor series of trainings for early childhood professionals with Swahili interpretation. Participants received resources and materials to support their work around supporting the families and children in their programs.


At the end of summer and early fall, this group of 37 gathered twice for peer-to-peer learning sessions, reflecting on what they learned and sharing their ideas and successes. They decided to build a Community of Practice and plan to meet again soon!





Early Math Matters – Professional Development Micro-Course

A total of 39 participants throughout the state began a Math for Preschoolers three-month micro-course led by the Erikson Institute this fall. Those who complete the course will receive a \$1,200 early math learning kit. A second cohort of the micro-course will be available in Spring 2025.



The Rural Development Initiatives' Pasos al Éxito child care start up trainings were created to bolster our state's early childhood workforce by supporting Spanish-speaking child care providers in rural geographies. These trainings have been delivered in three cohorts within the last year. During these trainings, we have had the opportunity to present valuable information on how to open and sustain a child care program in Idaho.

Scholarships for early educators

Academic scholarships offered through two of our projects reduce the financial barrier of higher education, making it more feasible for early care and education professionals to advance their formal education and career. We strive to support professionals at all stages of their career whether they need support for a single academic course in Early Childhood Education or their Graduate Degree.





Professional Development Badge System

This year, at the National Workforce Registry Alliance (NWRA) conference, the IdahoSTARS Project received the prestigious Human-Centered Design Award. This award recognizes the collaborative efforts made through the implementation of the IdahoSTARS Badge System and the redesign of the Professional Development System (PDS). The IdahoSTARS team ensured that the designs for a new professional development system were responsive and also met the needs of Idaho's child care workforce, aligning with national standards.

North Idaho Shared Services Alliance Pilot

In partnership with the North Idaho Early Learning Collaborative and IdahoSTARS Region 1 team, Idaho AEYC is engaged in this grassroots effort to shift the work of early childhood educators from surviving to thriving. A shared services alliance allows child care businesses to gain support that improves efficiency, reduces costs and creates economies of scale. Idaho AFYC covers fees for access to Wonderschool, a child care management software, as well as provides technical assistance for pilot leaders. Participants receive intensive business coaching and training.

Empowering families with resources

Strong families are the building blocks of a strong community. Every family needs the tools to support their children with stable, nurturing environments in their earliest years. By giving parents the resources they need and expanding early learning opportunities in Idaho, we increase children's chances of success in school and life.

Hiring of Kindergarten **Transition Specialist**

In 2024, we hired a Kindergarten Transition Specialist to explore how we can further build bridges between the home, early learning programs, and school districts for a smooth kindergarten entry. Multiple resources are in the works, like the Building Blocks for Success, a parent guide for school readiness that focuses on ages three to five. The Educator's Companion document will also be available that provides ideas about playful family activities and events that school districts can utilize to support parents. The Idaho Kindergarten Toolkit is another resource to help school districts curate nurturing experiences for children as they move through the early years and into the K-12 system.
